Establishing Consequences

As children get older, they express a desire for more independence. Part of independency is understanding the consequences of actions. Consequences teach children decision-making skills, a sense of responsibility, and the ability to learn right from wrong.

Types of Consequences

- Natural consequences happen as a result of a child's actions with no adult intervention.
- Logical consequences are planned and thought out as a result of a behavior.
- Logical consequences are most effective if they are related to the behavior.



Identify the Consequences

- Be specific about the behavior that will lead to the consequence.
- Choose consequences that are appropriate and where your child can understand the connection.
- Communicate consequences clearly and ahead of a time.
- Involve your child in discussing the consequences.
- When possible, give a warning before giving the consequence.



Follow Through with the Consequences

- State the consequence in a polite and to the point manner.
- Give the consequence immediately after the behavior.
 - Once the consequence is completed, quickly offer the child a new opportunity to be successful.
